## president's ponderings

My first responsibility as your new President is to thank our Immediate Past President, Nancy Hibiske, for a remarkable two years. Even prior to her *official* term of President, Nancy had been contributing to the operations of the Calhoun County Genealogical Society in a significant way. Her seemingly unlimited energy, enthusiasm and creativity have really been a benefit to the society and an inspiration to her officers.

Under Nancy's leadership, we have taken many strides to really reach out and become a *proactive* rather than *reactive* organization. A few of the accomplishments include: launching the Pioneer Certificate Program, bringing in Curt Witcher as an W.K. Kellogg Foundation Expert in Residence, reprinting the 1877 History of Calhoun County, achieving our membership goal of 200 members and strengthening our relationship with Willard Public Library. Additionally we are now exchanging newsletters with approximately 40 other genealogical societies. This brings in a tremendous amount of additional information to our members, and reciprocally "spreads the word" about our society's activities. Finally, our treasury is at an all-time high, allowing us to pursue some projects that would otherwise not be possible. I guess I should also mention that she somehow dragged me on television, with a couple of appearances with Dave Eddy and Linda Taffolla on Access Vision!

So, what's the vision for the next two years for the society? Here are a few of the things that come to mind. We have recently acquired a fine copy of the 1910 Portrait and Biographical Album of Calhoun County by Chapman's, and are considering that as our next reprinting project. We have gathered information on the descendants of over 100 pioneers to Calhoun County via our Pioneer Certificate project, and will be assembling that data for use by other researchers. Ruth Kaiser and her dedicated cemetery committee continue to amaze us by the way they are ticking off their list of cemeteries to transcribe, and will have more books available very soon. The *Index to Generations* that was compiled in 1995 has been extremely popular, and it's time to update the Index with names from the most recent two years of newsletters. Our experience with Curt Witcher and the Expert in Residence program couldn't have been better, and we are ready again with another Expert. Lorraine Johnson Coleman, author and lecturer, will be in Battle Creek in January, 1999. The Calhoun County Genealogical Society, along with Willard Public Library, is sponsoring her lecture regarding oral history and family tradition. Watch for details in *Generations* and local media.

Finally, I'd like to apologize for the slow delivery of the last newsletter. We understand that several members, particularly in the eastern part of the county, actually got their newsletter *after* the last meeting. Unfortunately, your editors found themselves overwhelmed with other commitments, and were not able to compile the newsletter and deliver it to the printer as quickly as we would have liked. Also, you may have noticed that we are now using non-profit, bulk mail. While it is a little slower, this saves your society over 66% in mailing costs, a significant amount as we mail over 250 newsletters, six times per year. We would like you to be aware that meeting information can also be found in several area publications including: the Battle Creek Shopper, Battle Creek Enquirer, Marshall Chronicle, Marshall Advisor, Albion Morning Star and Jackson Citizen Patriot. Additionally, our friend and member Dave Eddy gives us great meeting coverage on WBCCK radio. Remember our web site, <http://www.rootsweb/~micalhou>, where you can also find meeting information. Regardless, we sincerely apologize that the newsletters were delivered late, and will do our best to see that it doesn't happen again.

I am so pleased to be your President for the upcoming two years. I thank you all for the support you have always shown your officers, and look forward to some exciting times ahead.

## Obtaining Ohio Vital Records

After the year 1908 all birth and death records were maintained at the state level. There is also a statewide index of marriages since 1949. Prior to 1908 birth and death records can be found at the county level. The individual counties were required to keep these records beginning in 1867. A few counties have birth and death records as far back as 1840.

All vital records are open to the public. Information from these records may be obtained by personal inspection or by a written request to the Clerk of the District court in the county where the event occurred. The records vary greatly from county to county so it is recommended that you call to find out what is available and how much it will cost before writing. A fee is usually charged for each copy at both the state and county level.

Another excellent source for obtaining vital records from the State of Ohio is the Ohio Historical Society located at 1982 Velma Avenue, Columbus, OH 43211. Copies of death certificates for deaths occurring from 30 Dec 1908-1937 can be obtained from the Ohio Historical Society Archives Library at a cost of \$3.00 per certificate. Ohio residents add 18 cents for sales tax. In addition to death records, other genealogical material available at the OHS include: marriage records, census records, land entry records, tax lists, city and county directories, county histories, family histories and more.

I am researching the BUCK family with not much luck. The line I am researching is from NY. I've been searching for information on Aaron BUCK and his wife Julia (BROWN) BUCK. The only information I have on them is that they were the parents of Samuel BUCK. Samuel was born in Washington Co., NY on 4 Nov 1813. He married Harriet WALTERS, about 1836 probably in NY as all their children were born there. Their children were Josephine, Mary, Wilbur, Wesley and Estella. Samuel married (2) Jane SELSBY in Hillsdale Co. MI and married (3) Amarilla (Emma) MONROE 24 Jul 1867 Big Prairie twp, Newaygo County, MI. A daughter was born from the third marriage, Jessie on 11 Dec 1872, Aetna Twp, Mecosta Co., MI. If anyone can fill in all my blanks on this family, I would sure appreciate the help. I am also a BUCK. My mother was Elizabeth Jean BUCK JESSEN. This is where we are with family names. Our BUCK families lived in NY 1840; 1850's-present MI, CA; 1945-present (also AZ and WA). These are the names of our male ancestors with wives/children:

Hassan Alba BUCK - 1840 Orleans Co., Medina, NY, d. Los Angeles, CA 1921 at the National Home for Veteran Soldiers. He's buried at the LA National Cem. Civil War service at Gettysburg from 7th MI Cavalry under Custer. (m: Rhoda HOWE UPHAM, MI-NY-MA). Franklin M. BUCK, 1862 Eaton Co. MI, (m: Rose COOPER, Jackson MI). Fred Anson BUCK - 1866 Eaton Co. MI, (m: Sarah Jane COOPER, Jackson, MI - Rose's sister). Hassan Alba Cooper BUCK – Hubbardston Vil., Ionia/Clinton Co. MI. Also lived in Detroit, Lansing. He supposedly had another family, American Indian from Lansing? m: (2X's) Bessie Beatrice BISHOP, Calhoun Co, Battle Creek, MI. Lived in Bellevue, Eaton Co., (my mother's father and mother, my grandparents).

The first Hassan was living with a family in Jackson, MI in 1850 (per census) and the family, Joseph T. BUKE spelled their name OR it was interpreted by the census taker as "BUKE". H.A. BUCK also lived with an Alfred S. PAINE and family, in 1860 in Eaton Rapids, MI. They were blacksmiths. I have no clue who the parents of the 1st Hassan were... it could have been the BUKE's or the name could even be BEEBE?

Does anyone know the origin of the name Hassan? No, not Arabic. Irish, Dutch, German? WHO could he be named after?

They had five children: Mary E., James Nicholas, John J., Andrew E. and Elizabeth. Ellen DOLAN, the mother, died in 1869 in Marshall. The family later moved to Illinois. Elizabeth DOLAN died in 1889 and is buried in Marshall. Owen died in Chicago in 1880 but is buried in Marshall. Some of the children were born in Oakland County, MI.

## The Genealogical Death Indexing System (GENDIS) Updated

Michigan Department of Community Health Director James K. Haveman, Jr., today announced that additional years of information have been added to the Genealogical Death Indexing System (GENDIS), an Internet system of Michigan death records from before the turn of the century.

GENDIS, which first appeared on the Internet in April of this year, is a rich resource for historical death record information. This information includes the name of the decedent; the date, place, and cause of death; the decedent's occupation; parents' names and residence; and the decedent's place of birth. This indexing system, which is being maintained by the Division for Vital Records and Health Statistics, allows genealogists and others to use key facts, such as the decedent's name or year of death, to locate and view records of interest.

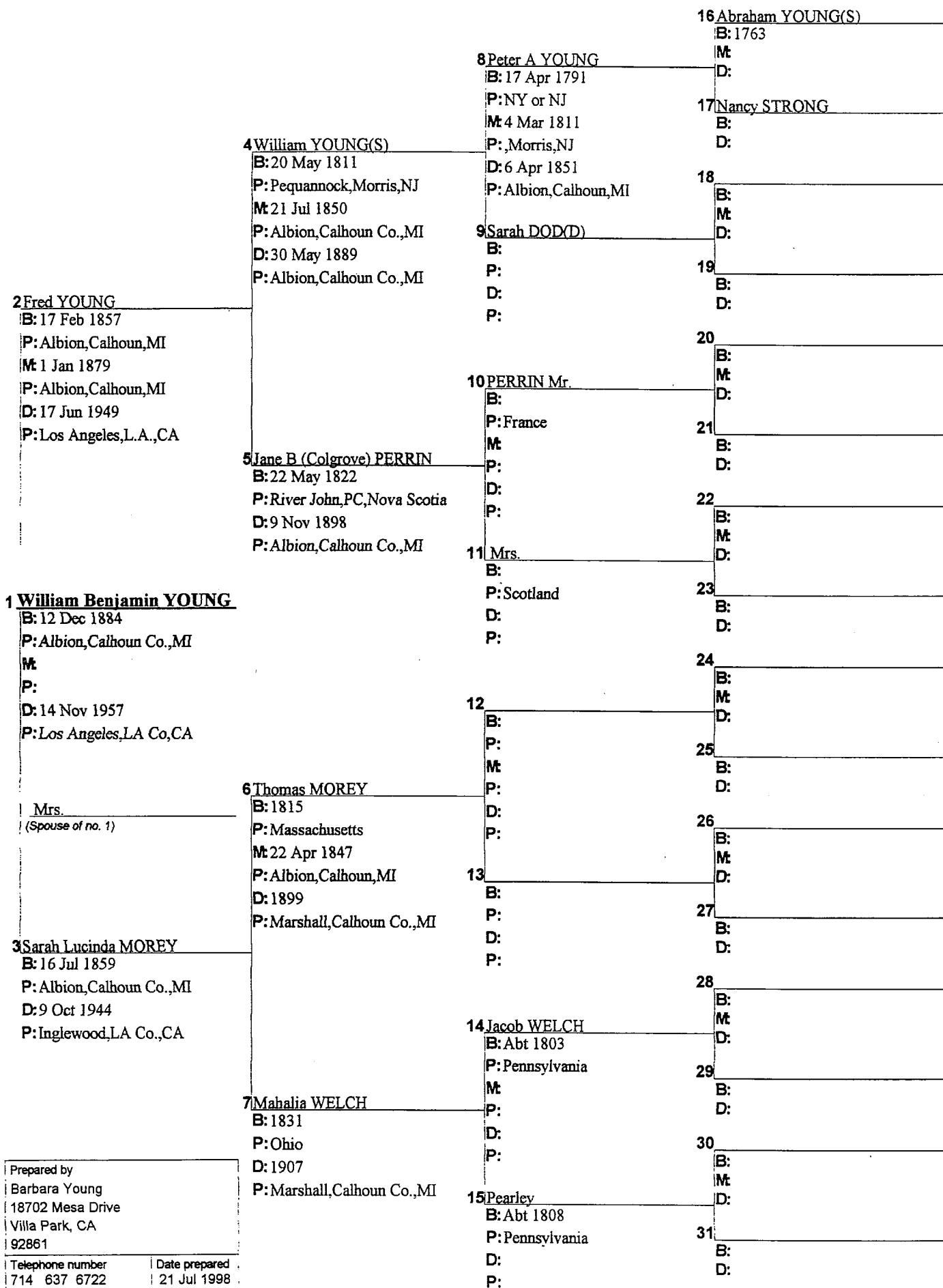
"I am so pleased that this automated indexing system on the Internet is receiving such positive response from our customers," said Haveman. "This is a fine demonstration of how the state can use modern technology to improve service."

This service is possible thanks to the efforts of volunteer genealogists from across the state and with the support of the Michigan Genealogical Council and the Abrams Foundation. This project, which began in 1987, has been conducted under the careful coordination of Margaret Tager Walker, a genealogist and coordinator of the project for the Michigan Genealogical Council. Copies of these early death records are prepared and distributed to volunteer genealogists across the state to be carefully deciphered and transcribed. These transcriptions are then captured electronically and inserted into the data file used by GENDIS.

The latest update provides information on an additional 63,500 death records to GENDIS data file, which now spans 1867-1882 for a total 148,000 records. When completed, the database will contain approximately 481,000 deaths records for the years 1867 through 1897.

Since April 1998, over 40,000 genealogists and others interested in locating death information have visited the GENDIS Web site.
