f you're looking for vital records from any of Michigan's 83 counties, a web site hosted by the State Archives of Michigan can help you learn how to get them. Our own Calhoun County Clerk-Register, Anne Norlander, along with her staff, conducted a survey of county clerks' offices across the state several years ago in order to make information about their records available to the public.

The site has been updated.

It's organized alphabetically by county and provides:

- Address, phone, fax and e-mail
- Genealogy research hours
- Identification requirements for use of records
- Cost of copies
- List of records and dates
- Comments such as whether the records are microfilmed, seating capacity for genealogists.

The site recommends calling to verify fees and hours before sending money or visiting.

Historical images of Battle Creek included on **Smithsonian Institution and Library of Congress web sites**

I illard Library is pleased to have caught the eye of the Smithsonian Institution and the Library of Congress. The Historical Images of Battle Creek link on the Willard Library home page includes photos of 11,000 homes in Battle Creek circa 1940. It also includes more than 5,500 photos of historic sites in Battle Creek from 1850 to the present. The Willard Library web address is www.willard.lib.mi.us.

The Historical Images site was nominated to the Smithsonian Institution for review by museum staff for inclusion as a recommended link on their site and it is now included.

The Library of Congress has also provided a link to the Willard Library site.

Willard Library is the only public library whose collection is linked from the Library of Congress "Pioneering the Upper Midwest" home page.

Calhoun County Civil War supporters

hile your ancestor may not have worn the blue uniform of a Union soldier in the Civil War, she or he may have supported the cause in another way. During the recent CCGS bus trip to the Allen County Public Library in Fort Wayne, I found this interesting list of war "subscribers" in a book titled *Michigan in the War*, published 1882.

According to the book, "The President of the United States had called upon the State to furnish one regiment of infantry fully armed, clothed, and equipped, to aid the Government in suppressing the existing rebellion." A \$100,000 cost was estimated, but the state treasury was short. The city of Detroit pledged the state a \$50,000 loan and called upon others to match the amount. These subscribers pledged loans for the purpose of raising the troops.

The call number at the Allen County Public Library is 973.74 M58m; at the Library of Michigan in Lansing it's E514.M62 1882. The book is also available in microform at the Library of Michigan. Check Fiche 2 N for call number E470 .C58 1990 MI:70-80. An index on microfiche is available in the same area.

Michigan in the War also includes regimental histories (that's why I checked it out!) and other state Civil War notes.

1870 Michigan census pages are online



he Library of Michigan gets a thumbs-up from this amateur genealogist for making the 1870 census images available online.

The slight effort it took me to search for my names, download pdf files and open them in Acrobat Reader was well worth the time. I sat in the comfort of my own home office and didn't put a single mile on my Oldsmobile. Better yet, I didn't have to crank through even one reel of microfilm.

I've heard some genealogists say they found the online images to be brighter and clearer than the often-scratched-and-worn microfilm reels. These are images of the actual census pages, so there's no worry about someone transposing information while transcribing it.

In a search for my ancestors, I found some of the pages amazingly clear and others incredibly faint. The censustaker in Detroit who recorded my great great grandparents wrote so neatly and darkly, that I learned without even using the zoom feature that their 15-year-old son, Franz Schoen, was a cigarmaker's

apprentice. The page showing great grandfather Peter Brennan in St. Clair County, however, was so faint that I couldn't make out but a few words on the entire page even after magnifying the words. The library says the images are only as clear as the original microfilm.

The 1870 census online index lists heads of household. Some other names are also included so they can be uncovered in searches, including boarders, a married son living with parents, a brother living with another family and several people of the same name living in a hotel.

The pdf viewer software needed to view the census page images is available free. A link to a download site is on the census web page.

Women in the Civil War


hirley Hodges, recognized genealogist and local historian, will present a program that discusses the role and importance of women in the American Civil War.

white marble tombstone was found buried in a backyard near the Lake Street entrance to the Kalamazoo County Fairgrounds. The inscription is:

Frank W. DePuy 1854–1931 "I found a friend in Jesus"
