

CCGS is a nonprofit organization recognized as tax-exempt under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue code. Contributions are tax-deductible to the extent provided by law. Individuals, libraries or societies may join. Annual dues for the year, beginning September 1, are \$18 for members choosing to receive Generations through postal mail or \$15 for members electing to receive the newsletter via e-mail. Memberships are accepted yearround; dues received after May 1 will pay for membership for the following year. Members receive Generations newsletter six times per year. General meetings are held at 7 p.m. the fourth Tuesday of each month at the Gifford Schultz Educational Service Center-CISD building, 17111 G Drive North, Marshall, unless otherwise specified. No meetings are held in July, August or December. Programs are free and open to the public.

Oak Hill Cemetery: Battle Creek's Oldest Burial Ground

E ach year hundreds of people from all over the world visit Oak Hill Cemetery to pay homage to such notables as Ellen G. White, Seventh-day Adventist founder; Sojourner Truth, temperance leader; Dr. John Harvey Kellogg, famous as the head of the Battle Creek Sanitarium; W.K. Kellogg, founder of the Kellogg Company and the Kellogg Foundation; C.W. Post, cereal and marketing pioneer; Erastus Hussey, a stationmaster for the Underground Railroad; Medal of Honor winners; veterans of all of our nation's conflicts; at least forty former Battle Creek mayors; and ordinary citizens, many of whose stories are told in the 1989 book, *Beyond These Gates:* 1994–1989. The book by Georgene Barnes and Constance White is out of print, but available in Willard Library's reference collection.

As one walks through Historic Oak Hill Cemetery you see reminders of Battle Creek's pioneers, war heroes, the famous and the infamous, bankers, merchants, farmers. Today Oak Hill Cemetery remains steeped in the history of the city and the people it serves. Dedicated to its purpose, "to be and continue to



be organized, not for profit but for charitable purposes and services to the people," it continues to provide a resting place for the deceased and solace for the living. Oak Hill Cemetery, a combination of the new and the old, is the common ground shared by all.

According to *Beyond These Gates*, "When space was needed for a burial ground for the first settlers who had died, Sands McCamly had given a plot of land on the edge of the town, for a cemetery. Soon the small cemetery was in the way. The town needed the space for shops and houses. In 1844, Oak Hill Cemetery became a part of Battle Creek history. It was born out of necessity and was started on 10 acres of land on South Avenue. After it was platted, the cemetery officials were permitted to remove all the bodies of the deceased from the old cemetery and re-inter them in Oak Hill. Many of the original families bought lots in the cemetery for their families. The Quakers, who had found it necessary to twice move their burial grounds, at last found a permanent place for their dead in Oak Hill in 1899–1900. By that time, the young men of Battle Creek had already fought in two wars and those that did not survive were brought home to be buried in Oak Hill. As the years passed, and the city became more populated, more land was purchased for the cemetery. As the city continued to grow so grew the cemetery until it became the size it is today. In given times and circumstances, growth and change became inevitable. The cemetery and the city were inter-woven in a continuous pattern of growth and change."

Between 1843 and 1844, several residents purchased ten acres of land south of the city for \$12 per acre. In 1844 Oak Hill Cemetery was organized under the Act of 1840. Esther Ann Cox, wife of Dr. Edward Cox, was the first burial, on May 21, 1844. Between 1850 and 1860, 14 additional acres were purchased. Burial lots were selling for \$20. Between 1890 and 1900, construction began on the familiar cobblestone fence and gate entrances. The old Quaker Cemetery (now Quaker Park) was abandoned in 1899. The city authorized removal of all remaining burials, transferring them to Oak Hill.

In 1911 William Hamilton proposed a public mausoleum in the cemetery. The board approved the erection of a 338-crypt mausoleum at a cost of \$3,000. Because of structural problems, the Oak Hill Abbey was abandoned in 1979. A monument was placed in memory of those who had been interred there. In 1927 a beautiful English Gothic-type chapel designed by Lewis J. Sarvis was opened to provide for small funerals and memorial services. In 1979 a crematory was built; a second crematory was added in 1999. Many hundreds of cremations are done each year.

Anyone having Internet access can visit Oak Hill Cemetery virtually via Find a Grave. Go to FindaGrave.com and click a search link. On the Cemetery Search page that results, enter "Oak Hill Cemetery," choose Michigan from the dropdown list of states, then click the SEARCH button. Click the link to the Oak Hill Cemetery in Battle Creek (it's a common cemetery name), and you'll be able to search the database of the nearly 29,000 interments online.

Many believe Oak Hill is full, but actually many more acres are available for future use. The cemetery offers numerous services. You are invited to contact the cemetery office on weekdays from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. for information. The office is at 255 South Avenue in Battle Creek.

Oak Hill sustained tremendous damage to its trees in the windstorm of May 29 this year. The cemetery board is doing its best to obtain financial support from various sources to fund recovery, but it will take considerable time. The cemetery lost about 80 very large old trees, which has forever altered the appearance of the cemetery.

Whether they scare you or fascinate you, cemeteries hold our past, and ultimately, our future.

National Archives Exhibit at The Henry Ford: Commemorating the Civil War

A new exhibit, Discovering the Civil War, is on display at The Henry Ford Museum in Dearborn until September 5 this year. A traveling exhibit from the National Archives, it's been described as "the most extensive exhibition ever assembled from the incomparable Civil War holdings of the National Archives."

The exhibit takes a fresh look at the conflict through little-known stories, seldom-seen documents and unusual perspectives. Visitors walk in the shoes of researchers, unlock secrets, solve mysteries and uncover unexpected events. The exhibit combines original treasures and interactive touch screens. Letters, diaries, photos, maps, petitions, receipts, patents, amendments and proclamations all become powerful tools to let visitors take a new look at a conflict that still touches our lives.

This exhibition peels back 150 years of analysis, interpretation and opinion to reveal a Civil War that is little known and even more rarely displayed. The exhibition is unconventional in every way. Rather than trying to re-create 1860, activities let visitors see the war through the lens of 21st-century technology. Passing over the traditional chronological approach, the exhibition is arranged by themes such as "Spies and Conspiracies," "Prisoners and Casualties," "Emancipation," "Global War" and "Raising Armies."

Visitors will discover

- the original Louisiana ordinance of secession.
- a "substitute book" listing names of men who were paid \$300 to replace draftees.
- original pension records of a Michigan woman, Emma Seelye, who served in the Union Army as Frank Thompson.
- a telegram from a Southern governor rejecting Lincoln's call for troops.
- film of the 75th reunion of Battle of Gettysburg veterans filmed by the Army Signal Corps.
- an original Freedmen's Bureau record documenting thousands of murders and outrages committed against African Americans.
- innovative wartime patents, including a multipurpose device that could serve as a tent, knapsack or blanket.
- the similarities between the Constitution of the Confederacy and the U.S. Constitution.
