Michigan Civil War African American Troops

Join CCGS on Tuesday, May 28th at 7 pm for a program on the role of African American soldiers in the Civil War. CCGS past president, Jim Jackson, will be our speaker.

The 1st Michigan Colored Troops, as they were known at the time, became the 102nd United States Colored Troops. They were formed in 1863 and comprised of volunteers from southern Michigan, Detroit, and Ontario, Canada. Some volunteers were ex-slaves and saw action in South Carolina, Georgia, and Florida. They fought beside the famed 54th Massachusetts Volunteer Infantry soldiers, the subject of the film *Glory*.

Jim has served in leadership roles of several genealogical societies including the Michigan Genealogical Council. Jim is a recipient of the Mary Lucy Kellogg Award, an award presented by the Michigan Genealogical Council for "significant contribution to the preservation and education of genealogy and history." Jim is the author of many articles and books.

Caring for Photographs

Tow that you have identified three of the worst places to store photographic treasures. Check properly.

Damage comes from three things: physical, biological, and chemical The best place to store your THEM! harm.

Cracked corners, tears, and folds are examples of physical damage. Insects, mildew, and mold are biological damages. Chemical damages can be faded, discolored, and stained photographs.

How can we avoid this damage? Storing photographs properly will avoid most of these problems.

Photographs need to be stored in dry, temperature controlled, pest free, light free conditions.

The attic, basement, and garage are will protect your

> important. There are archival and acid free materials. No industry standards are set for items labeled archival free. It is better to look for acid or lignin-free labels on the products you buy.

Try to identify as many photos as you can. Even part of the information is helpful. A soft lead pencil is the best tool for labeling the back side of the photo. If you must use ink, look for permanent, Storing photographs safely is waterproof, and quick drying pens. Use a light touch when writing on the back of a photograph.

A family history researcher can use this information to help date a photograph.

For example, the photograph to the right was taken Schumaker, 92 East Main St. Battle Creek, Mich.

The Tinder Directory shows that Ebbin O. Schumaker was in business from 1886-1931, a total of 45 years. If you check the supplementary information it shows he was at 92 East Main

Five Types of Early Photographs



The first type of photograph in the United States was the **daguerreo-type**. Samuel F.B. Morris visited photographer, Louis-Jacques-Mandé Daguerre, in Paris and brought the process to the United States, in 1839. For the next twenty years it was the one widely used. These photographs started with a sheet of silver plated

copper polished to a mirror finish. A multi-step chemical process was applied and when dry it was sealed behind glass to protect it.



Ambrotypes were patented in 1854 and popular until the early 1860's. They were less expensive to produce than the daguerreotype. It was printed on glass and some thought it was dull compared to the mirror finish of a daguerreotype. Many were kept in folding cases or framed because of their fragility.



A tintype photograph was made on a thin sheet of metal coated with dark lacquer or enamel. There is no actual tin in a tintype. It was cheaper, quicker, and easier to make than its predecessors: the daguerreotype and ambrotype. Tintypes were popular around the Civil War and until 1900. They were popular at fairs and carnivals.



Carte de Visite or CDV's were popular from about 1859-1890. They were small albumin prints mounted on cards 2.5" x 4." The characteristics of a CDV make it easy to date these photographs. The photographer's imprint can be found, often on the back of the card. Many families had these because for the first time they could be sent via postal mail without danger of breakage.

Cabinet Cards were introduced in 1866 and can be identified by their card mounting and size of 4.25" x 6.5". The elaborate logos on the card, either on the front or back, is another indicator of it being a cabinet card. The introduction of the Kodak Box Brownie camera in 1900 led to people taking their own photographs.
